The Roar is near followed by duck shooting, time for a reminder of the rules for transport of Firearms in a vehicle. These apply like using your seat belt or not using your cell phone, to all vehicle journeys. Be it short or long.

Key transport rules? (From NZDA National Office)

- 1. All firearms must be concealed from view from outside the vehicle.
- 2. Firearms must be made inoperable by removing the bolt or another vital part or by fitting a trigger lock or storing it in a locked case or carry bag.
- 3. Firearms must not be loaded with ammunition in the breach, barrel or chamber, or magazine.
- 4. Ammunition must be concealed from view from outside the vehicle.
- 5. Ammunition must be stored separately from all firearms and be in a locked glovebox or similar storage area where practicable (e.g. a cash box).
- 6. Food and toilet stops of up to 60 minutes are allowed if you have your vehicle nearby.

A few suggestions regarding this list. Put your bolt in your pocket (Preferably in a small bag) when leaving the vehicle. That way if it your vehicle is broken into and rifle stolen they can't use it even after breaking any lock. If your rifle has a detachable magazine a wire cable with lock can be fitted through the loading / ejection port of the rifle out where the magazine is fitted. This makes fitting a bolt impossible. These are available at a lot of Gun stores. Ammo buried in the bottom of your pack (If about to take a helicopter or boat ride) is likely suitable separation from your firearm. In a small locked box in your pack would be ideal (If you can find one). Taking your ammo in a separate box into a helicopter is not ideal, and one does not want to leave it behind when transferring things. Another good reason to have the bolt in your pocket, a quick feel confirms it is there and going with you. Don't forget your detachable magazine either. Something I have been guilty of. Also don't forget the keys to the locks!

Note check with helicopter and other transport operators how they want your firearms presented, some require hard cases some soft bags.

Another hint if stopping for a meal break/ toilet stop, please lock your car it is a given not in point 6 above. Also make sure it is not only the firearms that are out of sight, camera's and cell phones etc. are also inviting targets for those who don't respect the law and are becoming increasingly bold. One has only to look as far as the raids on retail shops in

broad daylight. A visit from such could ruin your Roar Hunt. The presence of people no longer deters them.

Remember if you don't follow the rules you need to do nothing else wrong to be in deep trouble regarding your Firearms licence. For example, your vehicle being hit by another illegally driven vehicle, resulting in a police presence at the crash site. Or firearms viewed at a random police drink driving stop.

So whatever your thoughts on these rules obey them keep out of trouble. Obey the rules of firearms handling too. Especially the one on Identifying your target. It becomes more important in the Roar, enjoy the Roar, come back with a trophy and photos for the Branch Competitions

Progress in making us all safer

We have all learned that full firearm registration will make us all safer. In that knowledge, we are tempted to ask how it is that despite practically all motor vehicles that are used on public roads (more than 4 million of them), between 10,000 and 20,000 are reportedly stolen annually.

Anyhow, for what it's worth, here is a chart showing progress t the end of February with the registration of firearms in New Zealand, data supplied by the Firearm Safety Authority:




Figure 1: Monthly display of firearm owners and the firearms they have registered to end of February 2024.

This chart shows that people are registering their firearms to comply with the law at a relatively constant rate over time.

Meantime, there are reviews being carried out over the hunting permit system by the Department of Conservation, and there will be a review of the Arms Act (1983) being carried out by the Associate Minister of Justice (Firearms).

When public submissions are invited on these two important topics, be sure to send comments in, or get help to put one in.
