Editorial

Some of you will have heard me say "Biology is not an exact Science". A prime example of this is that every plague that has occurred when it encounters a large enough population fails to wipe out 100% of it. An example of this in NZ was RCD / Myxomatosis when released on rabbits in New Zealand.

I am told that Chemistry and Physics are exact sciences. Which is the superior science? If Doc and ZIP have their way, we are in for one of the largest scale tests of these sciences in conflict (in the world) here on Stewart Island over the next few years,

Chemistry says a certain mixture of poison will kill all of the desired species that will eat it. Physics says that an even spread of such a poison by mathematically controlled means, will deliver the desired chemical mix to kill all.

Biology says;

A certain % will be more resistant to the poison.

A certain % may not like to eat the poison

If there is an area of high population in an area not all may get enough poison to eat.

Human error (which is also biological) may fail to deliver the right dose to all.

Some cats (which it appears will have to eat a dead rat to get a dose) may not like eating dead rats. (These surviving cats will then have primarily birds to live on).

Further there is talk of using Deer repellent on the poison, I hear some types are more effective than others, no announcement as of my writhing on this. What % of deer will it save? Is the prefeed to have deer repellent also? If not, the deer may eat this giving them a taste for the bait (Also making the later retardant added poison more likely to be eaten by deer). Plus denying the target species a chance to get their taste for the bait. More Biological variables.

For the programme to succeed 100% of all the target species need to be killed, can this be achieved by challenging the inexact science of Biology. Any kill misses not detected thus no follow up (one is relying on humans who are biological to do the miss detecting). There are reports from previous (far smaller) poison operations that indicate they were not all completely successful, without problems, with some bird numbers affected, not all the target species killed, and ongoing reinfestation problems. To not kill every last one of the target species will mean failure.

There is also the Biological (Human,) perception of such poison operations, who would want to knowingly eat seafood from the nearby area even if science (Chemistry) says it is safe to eat, why take the risk? *Note again Biology is not an exact science*.

If the operation fails it is more money that could have been better used elsewhere something this land does not have a surplus of going by the news..

Time will tell which science will succeed.

The following is one of a series of articles on hunting in New Caledonia written by John Berry (who has had to sadly give up hunting due to old age) and provided to me by his friend Geoff Jukes.

The 15 Minute Stag

John Francois, owner of the La Foa hotel come over to see me with a fax from Bob Penfold. It said that we had a client flying in from Tahiti the next day, (Sunday). In itself not a problem, but he was off to Brisbane Wednesday morning to continue his holiday with his wife.

Two clear days to produce a suitable stag!

John and I headed into the airport Sunday morning. John was accompanying me to help clear the client's rifle, as it had not been precleared with all the other firearms.

The airport at Tontouta is about half way between La Foa and Noumea, on the main sealed road that runs the length of the western coast, it travels through some areas that we hunted on a regular basis.

On this particular trip, about 15 minutes before the airport, we saw a nice stag with a group of females close to the road.

We duly cleared the client's gun and loaded him up into John's van and headed, back thinking that, we could not be lucky enough to have that stag still standing beside the road.

Well it was, so the hunter's rifle was hastily unpacked, loaded and the three of us crept across the road between the passing cars, crawled through a drainage ditch and took the offending beast. The client made his connection easily.



This month I am going to write about how well the Arms Act (1983) worked.

In two words, not bad.

This is because the 1983 Act was revolutionary in that it dispensed with making lists of the firearms owned by licensed people, noted their addresses, and kept registration for the far smaller number of collectible weapons such as machine guns and pistols belonging to collectors and to approved pistol shooters.

Practically all licensed firearm owners obey the law, (with two notable exceptions, one in 1990, the other in 2019) and a handful of mugs who sell off firearms to unlicensed people.

The rest of us obey because it is easy and saves us from grief, allowing us to keep using our firearms legally!

Next time you're at the range

Have you ever told a friend while sighting your rifle at the range, "I'm going to fire five shots into an 80 mm group at 100 m"? Despite all of our rifles being capable of sub-minute of angle groups (!), it is surprisingly difficult! Settling down, even using a rest, with your favourite hunting rifle (which may have been sighted in ten minutes ago) is surprisingly challenging, even if you're a dead shot on animals.

Tip, it is a lot easier with three shots!

Warm barrels, and identify that target!
